



A nature manifesto by young people for all in Pontypridd












Mae Natur Yma, Yma ac Yma. Nature is Here, Here and Here.

Imagine a different world - a world where nature and people can thrive together and then, let's make it a reality!!!




CROE50 TO ALL SPECIES VARIETIES


Gofynnwch ask someone you know what is it about nature that is important to you? People from different backgrounds have different ways to connect to nature, and we are all individuals.


RECYCLING SYSTEM

Mae dail y coed yn cwympo i lawr: system ailgylchu naturiol! Leaf litter is made of fallen leaves in the park and forest: like a natural recycling system!

It's a habitat, a home, a <u>cartref</u> for many small creatures, insects, fungi and bacteria. They thrive in **leaf litter.** Over winter the leaf litter breaks down and prepares for spring. It plays an important role in our ecosystem.

What about human-made litter, plastic litter? It's harmful to our town, our forests and wildlife. Not to mention it disrupts natural systems.

When humans 'leave' litter, animals suffer. So we humans have to be the recycling system and **not leave litter!** Try reducing single-use plastics and responsibly bin all litter and waste.

Ecosystem	A community of living things (like animals, plants, fungi, and bugs) living together. The type of place it is will change the types of living things that make their home there. For example a river ecosystem has lots of water and rocks, so the living things must adapt to survive.
Endangered	In danger of being lost forever.
Environmentally- friendly	To do a good thing for the Earth.
FFERMIO	Farming
Fungi	A group of living things including mould, mushrooms, and yeast.

Gender	Whether you are male or female, or something else.

Identity	How you feel, how you call yourself, and how you want to live. Your identity may be straight, or may be LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender or Queer).

Manifesto	A set of ideas, opinions, or views. It can also be a plan of action, or a list of things you can do to make things better!
Mycelium	The part of fungi that is usually underground, like the roots of plants.

ABOUT ENATUR DOENTY

This booklet has been produced with young people in Pontypridd as part of NATURponty - the Pontypridd Nature Reserve project - an art project that brings artists, scientists and young people together to discuss biodiversity and climate change. By learning about the nature that lives around our town and playing with new ideas to connect with wildlife & take responsibility for the environment, we hope to inspire everyone to think differently. As St David said- 'Gwnewch y Pethau Bychain': do the little things, and they can make a BIG difference!

The language in this publication is Wenglish- a mixture of Welsh and English. This has come about because we live in a bilingual country. Some can only understand a few Welsh words from road signs and other people can write poetry in welsh. We hope the way we have written this will help you pick up a few new words. If you are from a Welsh-speaking family, go to a Welsh language school, or are a Welsh learner, you can find on our website a version written in Shwmraeg- it's Cymraeg but not perfect! We hope it is another way to build bridges between the Welsh language, nature and our home. naturponty.eu/ shwmraeg/
